Our goal is to support vibrant communities and protect our environment by funding local projects that focus on People, Ideas, Nature and Education.



The OneFortyOne PINE Community Grants program supports local community organisations to do what they do best. This is why the funding model is flexible, we encourage people to help us direct the PINE grants funding where it is needed most. All through the year we support community led projects with grants of up to \$5,000.

In 2023 we supported the places where we live and work by sharing over \$125,000 with 48 local organisations and it was a busy year!

The PINE grants helped schools create gardens and make music. People at sporting clubs were supported to train and compete. Students studied science, books were purchased, and mental wellbeing was prioritised.

Of course, none of this is possible without the people who dedicate their time to running organisations like the ones we have supported. Funding availability is only part of the commitment that is needed, and we are proud we can make this contribution.

Grants are available throughout the year and applications are considered on a monthly basis by our community grant committees in Australia and New Zealand.

To be considered for funding, grant applicants must submit a short application via the online portal onefortyone.com/community/grants.



WANDERERS' NEW HOOPS

Basketball requires very little to play – just a ball and a court.

A collaboration between Wanderers Community Sports Club, the Tasman District Council and local businesses, including OneFortyOne has meant that kids, teenagers and families in Brightwater now have brand new basketball hoops, and a fresh court.

Previously an underutilised netball court, the revitalised court is one of the only in the region to be fully open to the public and is now played on dawn to dusk.

The project has improved sporting opportunities for the local community. The adjustable height function of the hoops means that wheelchair players can also enjoy the game.

Jimmy van Der Calk, the General Manager for Wanderers Sports Club said "We had an underutilised court next to our clubrooms. It appeared old and run down, equipment was outdated so it was no surprise people weren't using it. We wanted to turn it into a place our community would want to use."

This project has a lasting and inclusive impact that will see basketball played for many years to come.

STEM AND SUSTAINABILITY – THE TOY LIBRARY EXPANDS ITS COLLECTION

The Mount Gambier Toy Library has been a part of the lives of local families for generations.

First established in the 1970s, the volunteer run organisation is focussed on sustainability, and this has meant keeping toys in good condition, and keeping a catalogue of quality toys that remains relevant and fun over the years.

Volunteer Sarah Ellis said the Toy Library wanted to upgrade their STEM toy collection and invest in a quality collection to be enjoyed by local kids.

"We've been wanting to upgrade our STEM collection for a while," Sarah said.

"STEM toys can be expensive, so we couldn't afford to use our standard budget. We applied to the OneFortyOne grants program and were lucky enough to receive a grant that covered our wishlist."

Sarah said it takes an average of 36 days for children to lose interest in a toy, and 50% of toys end up in landfill within a year.

"Being able to borrow a toy, enjoy it and return it for someone else to enjoy, means less toys in landfill."

"We've worked really hard over the last few years on just getting quality toys, because we want children and families to be able to have access to all that regardless of economic status."
